Pets and fireworks: Not a good mix

This Fourth of July, pet parents are urged to remember that holiday fireworks are often at the center of lost pets and injuries, and the proper measures should be taken to keep all dogs and cats as safe as possible.

More pets run away on the Fourth of July than any other day, so you should take extra steps to ensure their safety. Keep a keen eye on your dog during the commotion, and make sure your pet is wearing proper identification.

Dogs have been known to try and attack fireworks or firecrackers, eat them, catch them or try to play with them, sometimes resulting in horrible injuries.

"People toss a firework or firecracker in the air, and the dog jumps up, swallows it,

how they should behave. If you're not making a big deal or showing excitement about the fireworks, then he will learn to be less concerned as well.

Reasons why dogs are scared of fireworks

1. They're loud.
Most fireworks make some kind of loud sound. Dogs have a more acute sense of hearing than humans, so those loud booms, crackles and whistles are alarming.

2. They're unpredictable.
You expect fireworks on holidays like the Fourth of July, but for your dog, it's just another day. Those firecrackers come without warning. The loud noises and flashing lights sound and look different each time.

and the firecrackers cause severe damage to the organs," Colorado veterinarian Eliza Mazzaferro explained.

Mazzaferro said fireworks can cause injuries in less direct ways, too. "Pets get anxious and break out of kennels, jump through windows and get lacerations, and when loose, can get hit by cars," she said.

Very anxious pets have been known to hurt themselves trying to flee from the unsettling sounds of fireworks. "I have seen them bite through a metal cage and injure their teeth and gums, and also jump through plate glass windows," said Mazzaferro. "They try to escape the noise, not knowing that it is outside."

Saipan Cares for Animals is taking precautions in the days leading up to Fourth of July festivities, knowing full well what can happen when a building full of animals is frantic with terror.

They dig out from underneath fences, they chew through fences, they harm themselves to get away from the sound because they don't know what it is, all they know is that it's loud and scary.

If you are going to be with your dog during the fireworks, sending the calming message that they are nothing to worry about will also help him to relax. Remember, though, while humans communicate with words, dogs communicate with energy, and will look to their pack leader for clues on

Plus, they come at different intervals, so dogs can't get used to them.

3. They pose a threat.
The noise and unpredictability of fireworks leads many dogs to perceive them as a threat. This triggers their fight-or-flight response. Your dog may bark at the noises or try to run away and hide. He may show other signs of anxiety, too, like restlessness, panting, pacing and whining.

4. Fireworks make dogs feel trapped.
Fireworks are inescapable on holidays like Independence Day. So if the noises trigger your dog's flight response, he will try to run from the threat. Unfortunately, there's often nowhere to go, as you can still hear those loud booms indoors.

What to do

White noise: This works very well: While the boom of an exploding mortar round can shake the house we can drown 90 percent of all sounds by cranking up the volume on the television, turning on our indoor A/C unit, and cranking our fans to high. Remain calm and talk to them in a soothing voice.

Give your dogs a safe place: At our house our dog's safe place is their crates. During firework season the importance of a crate is magnified. When loud noises strike indoor dogs finds more comfort in a dark closet than the crate so leave closet doors cracked so he can find his safe place. (PR)

Man allegedly steals a camera at Suicide Cliff

A man who allegedly brazenly stole a GoPro camera at the Suicide Cliff lookout in broad daylight last Sunday was arrested by police just about two hours later.

On Sunday, July 14, 2019, at about 7:18am, the Department of Public Safety received a 911 call reporting a theft incident at the Suicide Cliff lookout.

Officers who were dispatched to the location of the caller arrived at the scene at about 7:26am and met with an Asian male who said that he was the caller.

He told the officers that he was at the Suicide Cliff lookout and was recording the scenery with his friends, when he placed his GoPro camera on one of the railings before walking down toward the leveled area to fly his drone.

As he was walking down, he noticed a local male, skinny in build, wearing a black T-shirt, walk toward the rail-

ing and grab the GoPro camera. The Asian male approached the local male and asked for the GoPro camera, but the local male ignored him and got into a white sedan and drove off. The Asian male then took a picture of the vehicle's license plate and drove back to his hotel to call 911. The individual showed a picture of the vehicle to the officers, who radioed the plate number to DPS central. After the interview with the victim, officers began a search for the vehicle.

Around 9am, officers spotted a white sedan bearing the same plate number reported. As officers called it in, they walked toward the front door of the house and spoke with the owner of the vehicle, who admitted to taking the camera earlier at the Suicide Cliff lookout. At around 9:04am, the individual was placed under arrest for theft, read his Miranda rights, and brought to the Department of Corrections for booking. (PR)

High surf warning up until 6am today

A high surf advisory is currently in effect in the CNMI until 6am today.

That means high surf will affect beaches in the advisory area, producing localized beach erosion and dangerous swimming conditions.

Based on the information received from the National Weather Service in Tiyan, Guam and compiled at the CNMI Emergency Operations Center State Warning Point, a monsoon surge is producing hazardous surf in the Marianas and a large southwest swell produced by a monsoon wind surge was projected to produce hazardous surf and a high risk of rip

currents last night.

There is a high risk of rip currents along south and west facing reefs until this morning. The hazardous surf of 7 to 9 feet was predicted to subside last night and fall below hazardous levels by this morning.

The public is being advised to avoid venturing out along south and west facing reefs and beaches. Large breaking waves can knock you down and cause serious injuries. If you become caught in a rip current, remain calm. Swim parallel to shore, then back toward the beach when possible. Do not attempt to swim directly against a rip current as you will tire quickly. Order keeps details of seaman's suit vs US confidential

The federal court issued Monday an order that keeps confidential the details of a lawsuit that a merchant seaman filed against the U.S. government over the injuries he suffered aboard a ship at a dock in Japan.

U.S. District Court for the NMI Chief Judge Ramona V. Mangiona agreed that a protective order is appropriate as the parties in this case expect to exchange confidential personal and medical records.

They also want potential records protected since to the incidents complained of involve a U.S. naval vessel and personnel.

Merchant seaman Kenneth Lockhart, an American who is a resident of Saipan, alleged in his lawsuit that he suffered when a loaded pallet tilted and pinned him against the railings aboard a ship at a dock in Ja-

pan in 2016. Lockhart said the U.S. owned the vessel, USNS *Monford Point*, which was operated and managed by Ocean Shipholdings Inc.

Lockhart, through counsel William M. Fitzgerald, is suing the U.S. for negligence under the Jones Act, for unseaworthiness, and failure to maintain and cure the vessel.

Lockhart asked the court to hold the U.S. government liable to pay him damages, medical expenses, loss of earnings, and court costs. He wants a jury trial.

Mangiona ordered that any party or non-party may designate as "confidential" (by stamping the relevant page) any document or response to discovery which that party or non-party considers in good faith to contain information involving trade secrets, of confidential business or financial information, subject to protection under the law.
